## Why does attendance matter?

Attending school can be a passport to a child's future into adulthood, independence and achieving one's ambition. It has a direct impact on your child's learning and progress.

If a child has an attendance level of 90%, they will have missed one day a fortnight in school. Over a school year this will represent four weeks of absence.

**Most of our pupils are achieving above 96% attendance** - this is fantastic! Thank you for taking attendance seriously. I will be in touch soon if your child has persistently low attendance (at or below 90%) to talk with you about how we can support you to build on this.
